What a Show..... Record amount raised for Charity!



With over 15,000 visitors and a record amount expected to be raised for charity, the 16th Lancaster Insurance Classic & Supercars Show was the best ever in the history of the event. Held on Sunday 21 July in the beautiful grounds of Sherborne Castle, the show attractions included classic and supercars on display, motor clubs and trade stands, an auto jumble, craft fair, catering village, live music, children's rides and a Member's Club area. In addition there was a quality classic car Auction by Sherborne based Charterhouse.

Over 2,100 cars were on display, from veteran and heritage vehicles to the latest supercars. Special displays showcased Supercars, American cars, Rally and Race cars, Hot Rods and Custom cars. The 15,000 people who attended were treated to an excellent day out.

In addition to the fantastic range of vehicles on show, there was a chance to meet legendary motor racing driver and 5 times winner of the Le Mans 24 hour race Derek Bell. He patiently signed autographs and showed visitors the car in which he had such success.



The main beneficiary of show is the British Heart Foundation, however, 16 local charities will also benefit from the money raised.
